

- Our vision: addressing infringements and raising awareness
- Our values: independence, expertise, transparency and engagement

Our organisation, tasks and powers

- Located in The Hague, 80 FTE
- Specific tasks and powers of the Dutch DPA include:
 - Supervision
 - Providing advice
 - Providing information, education and accountability
 - International assignments
- Supervisory and enforcement powers

Selective to be effective

- Accountability
- Data Protection Impact Assessment (DPIA) and Prior Consultation
- Data Protection Officer (DPO)
- Data Breach Notification
- Administrative fines

Policy changes

- Complaint handling and initiating investigations
- Systematic supervision and principle of accountability
